Introduction




Be the Change: A Grandfather Gandhi Story-




Martin's Big Words: The Life of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.




Civil Rights Marches

Reading Level: 4th through 8th grade Genre: Nonfiction

Synopsis: This nonfiction book goes through the influences of the American Civil Rights Movement using photographs to highlight this time period. It provides a deeper look into the life of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and how his nonviolent marches and protests helped to gain equality for Blacks in America.





Gandhi (Icons: History Makers)

Reading Level: 4th through 8th grade Genre: Nonfiction

Synopsis: This biography written about Mahatma Gandhi documents his life and the man important things he did to help free India from British rule. Not only does it detail his life, but it also helps readers work on their thinking and writing skills.

Using Text Set in Instruction

The trade books that have been chosen will be paired with other texts in order to teach about the history of South Asia: The Indian Subcontinent. The texts will be used in Small Group workstations. The stations/texts are as follows.

Using Text Set in Instruction Activities

- At each workstation, the students will have chart questions to answer. Post-It Notes will be provided. The students in the groups will each choose 1 of the texts to read (multiple students may have to read the same text depending on group/class size). Chromebooks and key vocabulary words will be provided at each group for LEP learners to utilize. The students will then make text connections (text to text, text to self, text to world), and record their connection on the post it to display on the chart. The group leader will then lead the students in a discussion about their topic. Each group will rotate through all workstations.
- During the Small Group Teach Read Aloud station, the teacher will utilize the anchor text to connect all of the texts together. The teacher will read with their small group, pausing for reflection and comprehension. After the book has been read, the students will have a reflective writing time, also making text connections.
